Radical psychiatry was a significant influence in the early development of transactional analysis theory and practice. However, in many ways it has since become a lost tradition. This workshop reclaims the influence of radical psychiatry in TA from a contemporary perspective. Keith will introduce the background, theory and practice of radical psychiatry, summarise its treatment emphasis; aetiology (alienation); presenting problems (powerless scripts); treatment methods (increase awareness and permissions); tools (organisation against social oppression); and goals (autonomy through co-operation). There will be opportunities for discussion, demonstrations, presentation of clinical and other material, and small group work.

He is Professor of Psychotherapy at Auckland University of Technology, where he is currently Head of the School of Public Health and Psychosocial Studies. He is the series editor of *Advancing Theory in Therapy* (Routledge), the editor of *Psychotherapy and Politics International*, and the co-editor of *Ata: Journal of Psychotherapy Aotearoa New Zealand*. He is the author/editor of over 250 publications, including thirteen books, the latest of which is on *Co-Creative Transactional Analysis* (Karnac, 2015). He is currently working on a critical examination of psychotherapy, which is informed by radical psychiatry. He has a small private practice in West Auckland.
